About Vermont Foodbank

- **The mission of Vermont Foodbank** is to gather and share quality food and nurture partnerships so that no one in Vermont will go hungry. In 2025 we distributed 14.5 million pounds of food.
- **Vermont Foodbank is the largest and only statewide Food Bank** serving all 14 counties in Vermont.
- **VF operates three distribution centers:**
 - **Barre** - our largest distribution center serving northern and central Vermont (Orange County & north)
 - **Brattleboro** - serving southern and eastern VT (Windsor, Windham, Bennington)
 - **Rutland** - serving central and western VT (Rutland & Addison)

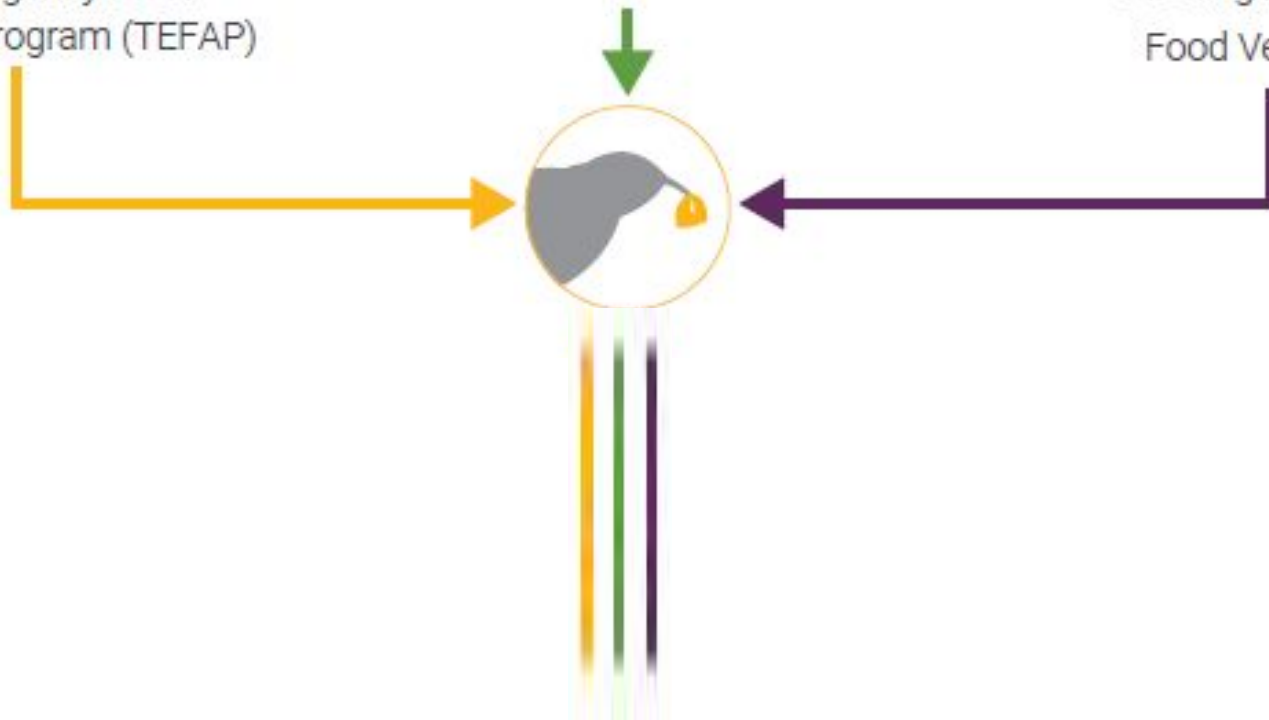

Donated Food

About 60% of food Vermont Foodbank comes from donations, from sources like:

- Local & regional grocery retailers
 - Includes fresh foods and shelf-stable grocery foods. keeping food out of landfills.
- Larger wholesale donations from manufacturers
- Community Food Drives
- Donated food has no limitations on who may receive it.

United States Department of Agriculture Food

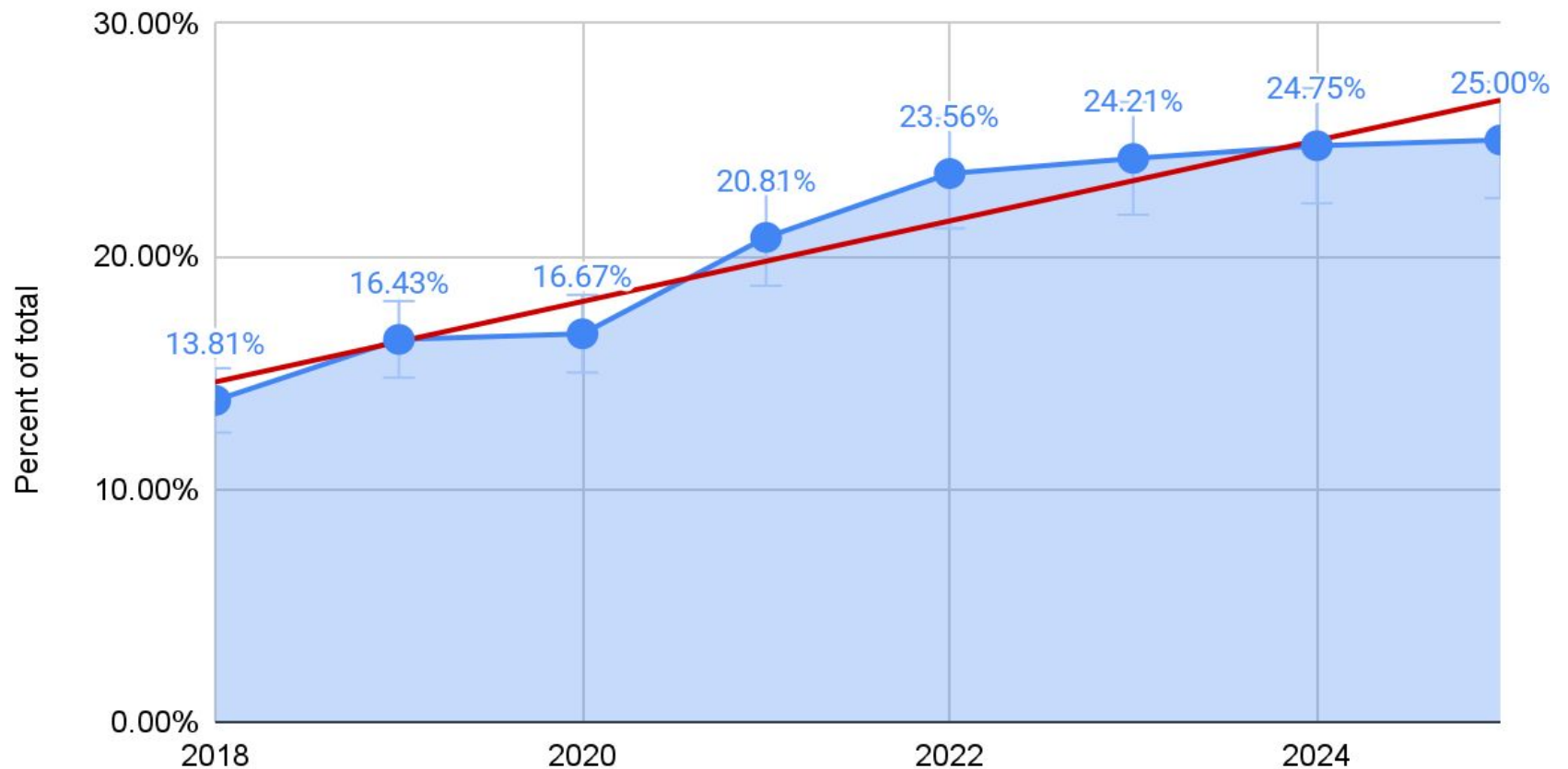
About 15-20% of the food distributed comes from the USDA, used to be called Commodity Food.

- Food for The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP)
- Food for the Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP)
- Program eligibility guidelines mean not everyone can access this food and about 70-80 partners carry this food at any time due to requirements, administrative burden, and dignity of shopping experience for neighbors.

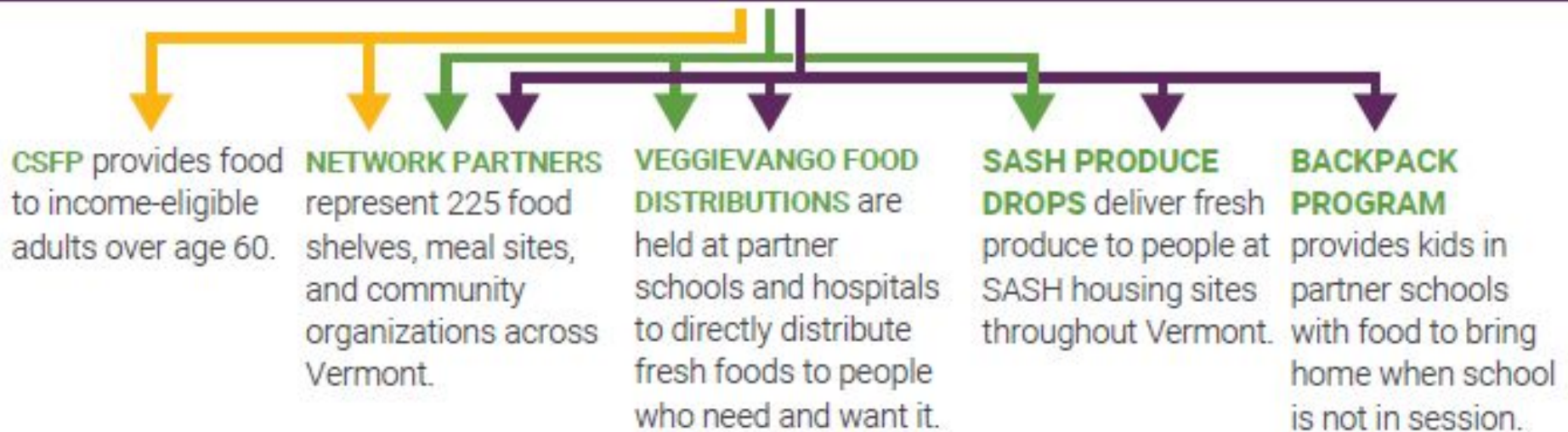
Purchased Food

Purchased pounds as % of total pounds distributed



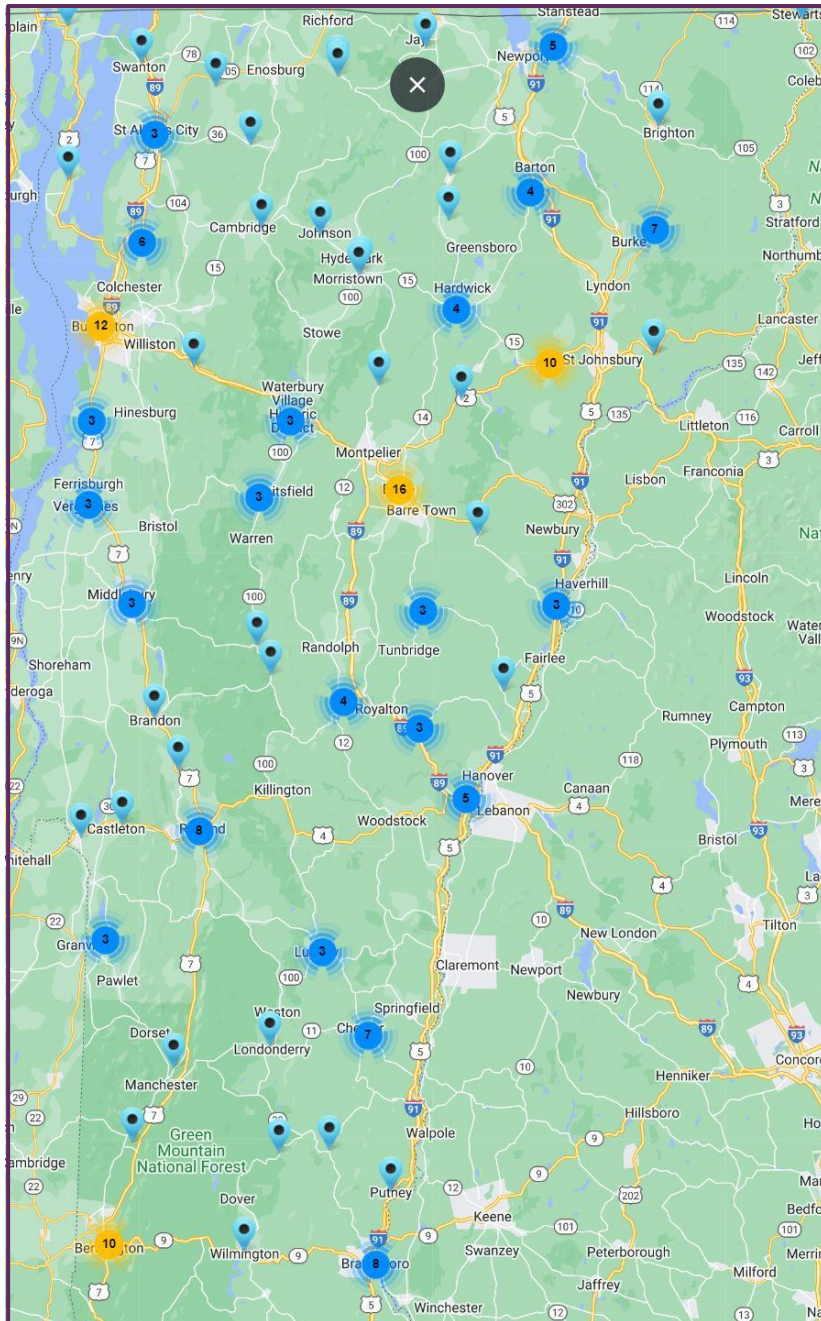

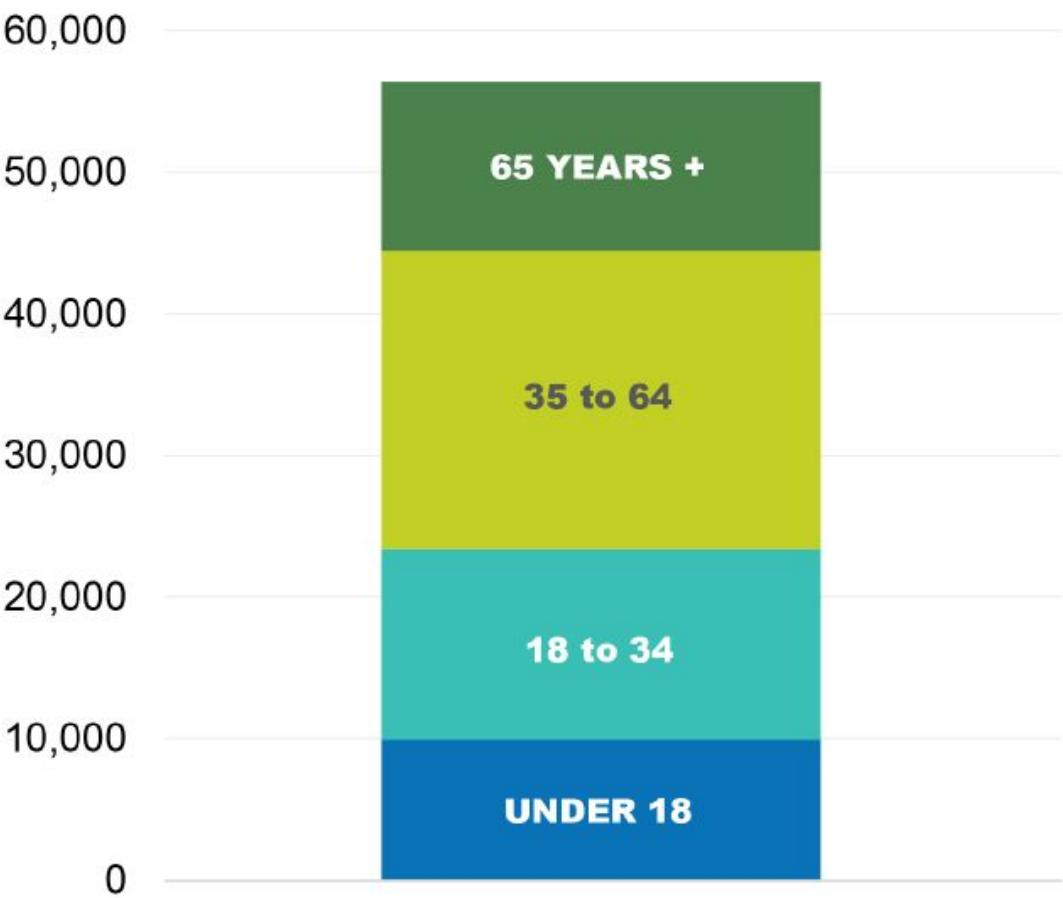

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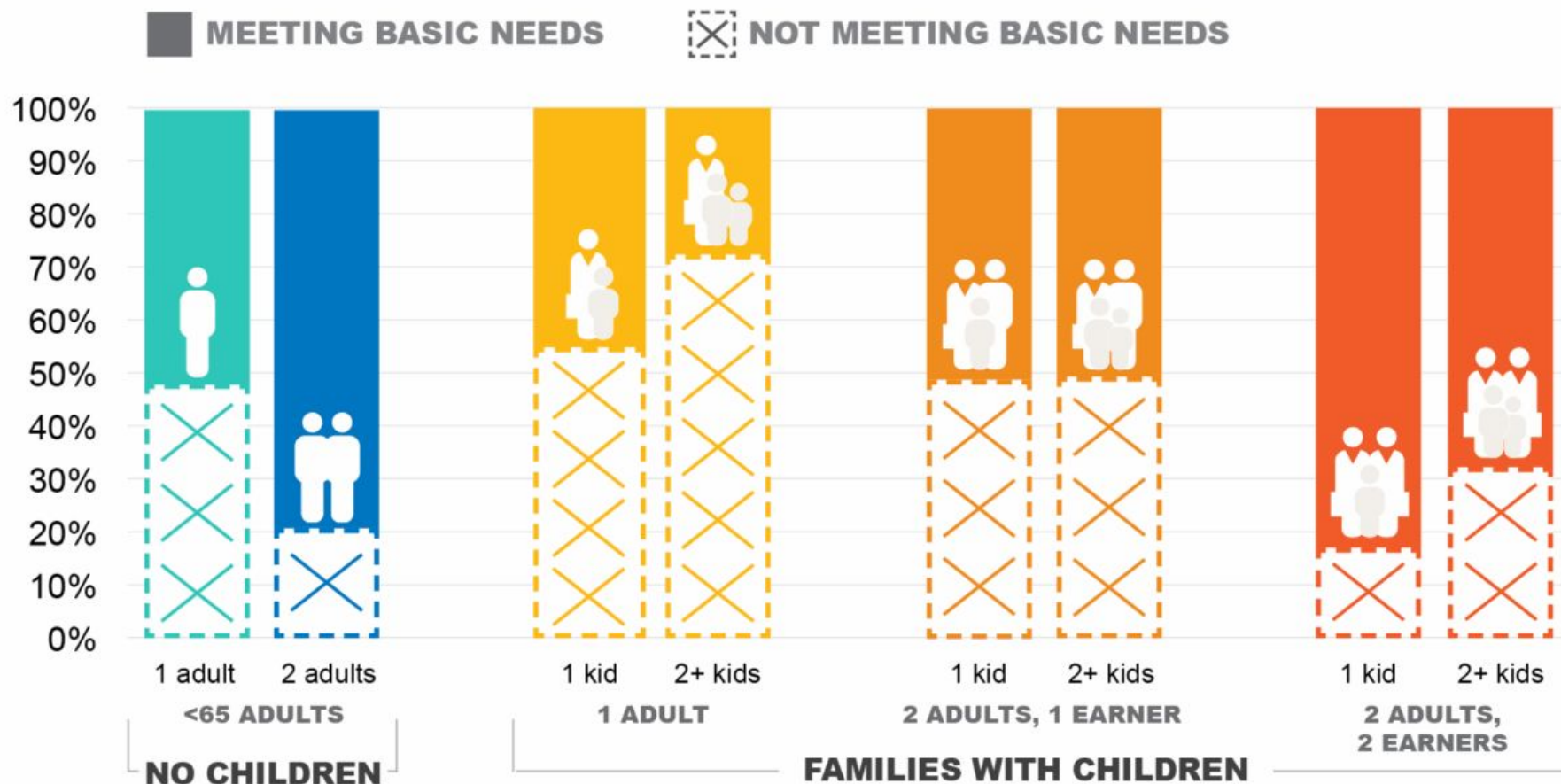

Systemic Challenges & Urgent Solutions

The State of Vermont can make policy choices to ensure food security for everyone who lives here.

Right now, government **must support the charitable food system** to improve food security for everyone in Vermont.

Together, we continue the work **for permanent, dignified, and sustainable food security solutions.**

Impacts on food security are some of the **longest-lasting after-effects** of disasters & disruptions.

FY27 Budget Request

Vermont Foodbank (VF) is seeking **\$5 million total in FY27 from the State of Vermont:**

- **\$2 million** for Vermonters Feeding Vermonters grant program at VAAFM
- **\$2 million** to support VF's network food shelves and meal sites
- **\$1 million** in base funding for Ready Response

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\$2 million for Network Partner Support

Economic, social, and environmental changes and uncertainty continue to make it difficult for people in Vermont to meet their basic needs. Neighbor visits to our network of food shelves and meal sites are more frequent and people are seeking more food each visit.

\$2 million in funding will support food purchasing and distribution to continue to keep shelves stocked across the state.

- The State of Vermont can lean into leadership and help to fill the need that is in our communities so Vermont Foodbank's network partners can maintain the current level of support for our neighbors.
- This request is responsive to the needs of neighbors and our network of partner organizations serving people's basic food needs.

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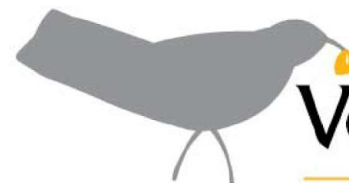
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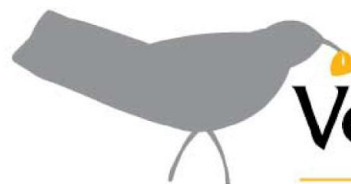
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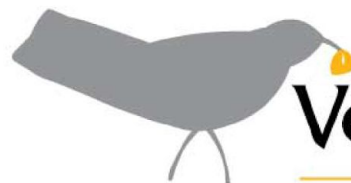
